Call to Order/Verify Quorum: Chair Keeley called the September 2024 GAB CPAC meeting to order at 6:30 pm. Rosemary Wesolowski verified that a quorum was present.

Pledge of Allegiance

Approval of the Previous Meeting Summary – Approval of the August 2024 meeting summary was completed.

Presentation(s): Stephanie Means, Duval County Extension Office, informed the CPAC about Florida Friendly Landscaping (FFL).

The purpose of Florida Friendly Landscaping is to have an integrated approach to maintain an attractive, colorful and diverse yard that is friendly to wildlife, is easy to maintain, conserves water and protects water quality (in lakes, streams/creeks, retention ponds, rivers and the ocean. There are nine Florida Friendly Landscaping principles:

- Right plant, right place- choose a diversity of plants and use native plants when you can.
- Water efficiently follow the Duval County Irrigation Ordinance, check and maintain irrigation systems, only water when needed and do not water pavement.

- Fertilize appropriately follow the Duval County Fertilizer Ordinance, only apply fertilizer when the grass is actively growing, do not fertilize if heavy rain is expected, leave a 10-foot buffer by water bodies.
- Mulch to buffer soil temperature, slows evaporation, reduces water needs, inhibits weeds and adds nutrients to the soil.
- Attract wildlife by using plants of varying heights to create layers for shelter, choose plants that are a food source: seeds, nuts, berries, and nectar.
- Manage yard pests responsibly identify your pests and use the least toxic method first. Spot treat vs broadcast application.
- Recycle Yard Waste use fallen leaves and pine needles as mulch under trees and shrubs, create and maintain a compost area or utilize horticultural recycling at the curb.
- Reduce stormwater runoff keep water in landscape, use porous surfaces for walkways, patios and driveways. Direct downspouts/gutters to porous areas and install a rain barrel.
- Protect the waterfront establish and maintain a 10-foot buffer zone near waters areas. Plant a border of low-maintenance native plants between lawn and shoreline/seawall to absorb nutrients, provide wildlife habitat and prevent erosion.

Duval County Public Schools - Sharwonda Peek shared the following information:

- The Master Facility Plan meetings/discussions continue.

FDOT – Derek Dixon provided the following updates to questions that were emailed to him. The updates are:

- There was a question requesting FDOT to turn the traffic signals to flashing yellow lights on Kernan Boulevard (from McCormick Boulevard to J. Turner Butler Boulevard)? This is a City of Jacksonville Road, not a FDOT road; contact the City of Jacksonville to make the request.
- There was a question about development in the vicinity of Merrill Road/I-295/Southside Connector; how will this change these roads? FDOT has studied the I-295 corridor from the Dames Point Bridge to J. Turner Butler Boulevard. Everyone was encouraged to visit <u>www.NFLroads.com/I295</u> to see the study and the latest updates. It was noted that none of the recommendations or updates that are included in the study are funded.
- On Atlantic Boulevard can a flashing yellow light be added at Kensington Gardens? It was stated that Kensington Gardens will not get a flashing yellow arrow to allow left turns. It was noted that FDOT (Traffic Engineering) is constantly evaluating the roads, intersections, traffic flow and the use/types of traffic lights in use.
- It was noted that there are several questions/concerns submitted pertaining to the development of the Madison Palms community, and improper driving; are not FDOT issues.

Jacksonville Public Library (JPL) – Devon Holland introduced herself to the CPAC and provided the following information:

- September is National Library Card Sign Up Month; please get a library card if you do not have one.
- A brand-new library catalog system will be installed to enhance your browsing and borrowing experience. The new catalog is set to launch on October 10, 2024, with a transition week starting from October 1-9, 2024. To ensure a smooth transition, it was encouraged that you stock up on your favorite books before the conversion begins. During the transition period (October 1-9) you can:
 - Use Libby to borrow books from the library, borrow eBooks, Audiobooks, and magazines; use Hoopla to borrow eBooks, eAudiobooks, TV/Movies, and Music.
 - Stream films from Kanopy.

 - Use public computers and print documents

Municipal Code Compliance Division (MCCD) - Robert Bautochka shared the following updates:

- In the past 30 days, 1,142 inspections were completed, and 577 snipe/litter signs were removed.
- A special project was completed in the Woodland Acres Community, specifically on Dandy Avenue. There were 64 new cases opened due to the project on Dandy Avenue.
- Florida Senate Bill 60 prohibits code inspectors from initiating investigations of potential violations of codes and ordinances by way of anonymous complaints. The tickets will be closed if they are submitted anonymously.
- Supervisor Bautochka answered questions pertaining to shed maintenance, what types of vehicles are allowed to be parked in driveways, questions about fences and concerns about overgrowth on the service road near Beach Boulevard and San Pablo Road.
- It was questioned if bees and aviaries are considered livestock, and can they be kept in a back yard? Planner Connor Corrigan did some quick research and reported that they are not considered livestock and can be maintained in a residential backyard.

LUZ (Land Use and Zoning)/Governmental Affairs – **Mike Corcoran** stated the subcommittee reviewed two LUZ applications and decided that no action was needed to move either application along. After this report, Member Eddi Parsons requested further discussion about application 2024-0668; the CPAC discussed the application. After the discussion, Member Parsons stated she would like to make a motion to have the record reflect that the GAB CPAC supports this application. There was a second and the CPAC voted that they support this application.

Beautification/Parks – Larry Belge – reminded everyone that we have received a lot of rain, and the grass will be growing. If you see homes, parks and other areas with grass that exceeds 15 inches in height, please call 630-CITY to report it.

Ad Hoc Committees:

North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (NFTPO) – Scott Cowitt attended a meeting last week, and they discussed the Transportation Improvement Program for FY 2024/25 – FY2028/29. In our area projects that were discussed include projects on University Boulevard, Merrill Road, Townsend Boulevard, the Arlington Expressway and the Mathews Bridge. One project that will be implemented is the Mayport Ferry; the ferry will increase service by 50%.

There was also discussion about future funding of roadways. Most funds come from tax on gasoline. With more drivers using hybrid or electric vehicles, this decreases funds available for roads. There are ideas under review on how hybrid vehicles and electric vehicles can contribute financially to help maintain our roads.

Park Safety Council – is currently vacant. CPAC Member Donnie Oulton has submitted an application and he is hopeful to hear an update soon.

Neighborhood Services Office Report – Rosemary Wesolowski reminded the CPAC that the election for CPAC Chair and Vice Chair will be held at the November meeting. Volunteers to serve on the temporary subcommittee are needed. Additionally, nominations are also needed. Our current CPAC Chair, Tim Keeley and Vice Chair, Delmas Dedee Harper are eligible to serve in those positions one more year if nominated. Public Comment – Visitor David Ledbetter stated he is working with JEA regarding awareness pertaining to residential solar panel fraud.

Visitor Debbie Gelwicks, Vice President of Ashley Green HOA, stated she is deeply concerned about a proposed development project (of 75 townhomes) that will be located on a private road off Fort Caroline Road. It was stated that Ashley Green HOA, the surrounding neighbors and neighborhoods would prefer single family homes instead of the townhomes.

Visitor Judy McKinney stated she lives on Allenby Drive, the private road where the proposed development project will be developed. Ms. McKinney explained the impact this development would have on the small private dirt road and the challenges the residents of Allenby Drive would face with increased cars on the road. It was stated that they have held a town hall meeting to discuss this proposed project and they have shared their displeasure with Councilman Amaro.

Visitor Ed Radloff stated he is the President of the Colony Cove HOA, a 192 single family home neighborhood that abuts the proposed development project land. Mr. Radloff stated that the project consists of 11 acres, of which 7 acres are proposed to be developed into 75 townhomes. Mr. Radloff described the area and expressed the negative impact the proposed development would have on the area and the neighbors in his community that live adjacent to the proposed development.

Visitor Dot Belvins, Brittany Bluff HOA, expressed her concern with the proposed development and the negative impact the development would have on the surrounding area and frustration with the congested traffic as it is without adding the additional vehicles.

Motion to Adjourn – there was a motion and a second; the meeting was adjourned.
