Meeting Summary

- 1. Call to Order/Verify Quorum: Chair Purdy called the meeting to order at 6:31 p.m. Michelle Godwin-Ware verified a quorum.
- 2. Approval of the Previous Meeting Summary: The CPAC approved the August 14, 2024, summary.
- 3. Elected Officials' Reports:
- Breyuanna White, Executive Assistant to Council Member Tyrona Clark-Murray, District 9, introduced herself to the SW CPAC as Council Member Clark-Murray's new ECA. Ms. White announced that for the past few days, it has been reported that a man in his 20s or 30s has been entering homes and watching women in the Lakeshore neighborhood between San Juan Avenue and Lakeshore Boulevard. Assistant Chief Redgate will provide details regarding the incidents and suspect. Citizens are welcome to contact Ms. White with any questions or concerns.

- 4. Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) Assistant Chief Eric Redgate reported.
 - The Peeping Tom in the Lakeshore corridor was apprehended on Saturday, September 7^{th,} and is now in jail. The perpetrator was entering homes that were unlocked and watching women and children. No sexual crimes were committed. The suspect had a few warrants and is in jail for them. JSO's burglary teams and sexual assault detectives have retrieved DNA evidence from the scenes and are awaiting the results from the forensic team so he can be charged with the burglaries.
 - Violent crime is down across the board. Murder is down 16%, robberies down 26%, aggravated assault down 10%, and simple assault is down 9.8%.
 - The Sheriff's Town Hall meetings went well, and Sheriff Waters will continue to host them.
 - It is an excellent idea to place No Trespassing signs and Beware of Dog signs in visible locations of fences and yards to help against criminal and civil liability charges.

- 5. Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department (JFRD) Lt. Clarence Hodge reported that many of the JFRD calls for service in the summer are for heat-related emergencies. He recommended that those who must spend time in the heat stay hydrated, wear lightweight, light color, loose-fitting clothing, and take lots of breaks in air conditioning when possible. Lt. Hodge reviewed the symptoms of heat stroke, heat exhaustion, and heat cramps. Presentation/Guest Speaker: Project Manager Philip Williams of the JEA Solar Concierge Program presented the purpose of JEA's Solar Concierge Program: to act as a trusted solar advisor for JEA customers. JEA has assembled a Solar Unified Network (SUN) with vetted local solar contractors who meet business license and insurance requirements, have satisfactory ratings with the Better Business Bureau, and have been trained by JEA on proper solar-to-residence interconnection. The program also assists customers in determining if the installation of solar energy is for them. 9. Staff Reports:

- Jacksonville Electric Authority (JEA) Don Tuten, Governmental Affairs reported:
 - JEA now has dedicated staff members who are part of JEA's Solar Concierge program. The program's goal is to provide citizens with as many resources and information as possible to assist with making a fully informed decision before purchasing and installing any rooftop solar system.
 - During hurricane season, JEA continues using its Power Restoration 1, 2, 3 processes to quickly assess and repair service to facilities, customers, and address isolated outages.  - Residents can track their electric and water usage using the Track Your Usage link. This link allows residents to monitor their usage, assisting in reducing consumption. - Jacksonville Public Library (JPL) Lynne Baldwin, Executive Assistant Library Services I, reported:
 - September is National Library Card Sign-up Month. Jacksonville Public Library encourages residents to sign up for a library card if they don't have one. Residents of Duval County may sign up for a library card in person at any Duval County Public Library or online by visiting the Jacksonville Public Library website: <u>https://jaxpubliclibrary.org/services/get-library-card</u>. Library cards must be renewed every three years.
 - A new library catalog upgrade is on the way to enhance the browsing and borrowing experience. The new system is scheduled to launch on October 10, 2024, with a transition week starting October 1st through October 9th. Customers can still borrow ebooks, eAudio books, Magazines, TV/Movies, and Music from Hoopla during the transition period. Stream films from Kanopy, access LinkedIn Learning and other digital platforms, and use public computers and print documents.

• The Jax Book Fest will be held on Friday, September 20, 2024, and Saturday, September 21, 2024, at the Main Library, 303 N. Laura St. A free writers and publishing workshop has been added to Friday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Featuring authors, Vashti Harrison, Jason Reynolds, and Gabriel Zevin from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The focus is free writing, self-publishing workshops, and networking opportunities with local writers' groups. - Municipal Code Compliance Division (MCCD) Jared Chemay, Code Compliance Supervisor, reported that 1,071 cases were completed in August. Year to date, a total of 11,759 inspections have been completed.
 - MCCD has proactively started doing projects for proactive sign collection each month, issuing citations for signs found in the city right-of-way.
 - The MCCD can assist in mitigating issues caused by storms, such as unsafe structures, dead trees on private property, or trees falling on things, and enforcing trash or debris collected on private property. Damaged roofs or damaged sheds can also be reported through 630-2489(CITY).
 - Trees growing into primary power lines along the right-of-way should be reported to JEA for inspection.
 - Per Senate Bill 60, citizens can no longer be anonymous when calling 630-2489(CITY) to make a complaint.

• Public Works (PW) – Jeremy Wright reported that 35 capital projects are in various phases in Planning District 4. Mr. Wright announced that Public Works closed out 19,000 service tickets and has 3,000 open tickets through 630-2489(CITY).

10. Subcommittee/Liaison Reports:

- LUZ Subcommittee & Planning and Development—Chair Purdy reported that the subcommittee reviewed six applications. The Southwest CPAC's LUZ subcommittee recommended opposing application MM-24-01. A recommendation was made to approve Ordinance 2024-0678 and Ordinance 2024-0680 with recommendations. CPAC members passed the SW LUZ Subcommittee recommendations.
 - MM-24-012 Minor Modification to a PUD The west side of Oakleaf Plantation Parkway, across from address 417 Oakleaf Plantation Pkwy: The applicant seeks to reduce the minimum townhome lot size to 1,500 sq. ft., and each townhome shall provide two parking spaces, with no guest parking required. A motion was made and seconded to oppose the application because it deviates from the zoning's required number of guest parking spaces. CPAC members passed the motion unanimously.
 - Ordinance 2024-0678 Planned Unit Development Rezoning 14066 Normandy Blvd.: The applicant seeks to rezone 41 acres from Agriculture (AGR) to Planned Unit Development (PUD) to permit a development mix of 117 single-family Units and 146 townhome units. A motion was made and seconded to oppose the application. The motion failed. After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded to approve the application, with the recommendation that additional ingress and egress be added to the planned development due to its size and number of units planned. CPAC members passed the motion unanimously.
 - Ordinance 2024-0680 Planned Unit Development Rezoning 5175 Justamere Rd.; The applicant seeks to rezone 18.99 acres from Residential Medium Density-A (RMD-A) and Planned Unit Development (PUD 2022-0893-E) to Planned Unit Development (PUD) to allow for 216 townhomes. A motion was made and seconded to approve the application, with the recommendation that a

traffic control device or an additional ingress/egress be added to the development due to the potential of 432 vehicles being added to the number of cars entering and exiting from the existing Magnolia Valley subdivision onto 103rd Street. With the daily increase of traffic on 103rd Street due to increased commercial traffic and additional Planned Unit Developments either already approved or in the early stages of planning, travel safety on this road is increasingly dangerous. CPAC members passed the motion unanimously.
