

# History of Diversion

2017: State Attorney Melissa Nelson convened the Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee (JJAC)

June 2019: The JJAC issued its Final Report and Recommendations which led to the creation of the Juvenile Diversion Transition Committee in partnership with the Kids Hope Alliance.

July 14, 2020: KHA released an RFP for the development and implementation of the Juvenile Justice Diversion program.

**September 3, 2020:** The Partnership for Child Health received the Juvenile Justice Diversion award from the Kids Hope Alliance.


**February 1, 2021:** The State Attorney's Office transitioned all diversion cases to the Partnership for Child Health.

The purpose of the grant is to complete a strengths and needs-based assessment with youth who are referred by the Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), in hopes to link the youth and family with services in the community.



#### **Diversion Youth Served**






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**Charges Breakdown** 

Feb 2021-May 2024



## Global Assessment for Individual Needs (GAIN) Results



#### **Diversion Youth Served**




